The Making of a Museum

It has taken three years in planning but, as these pictures show, what a difference the project has made to a wing of the Thoresby Courtyard.

Visitors have been flocking in their thousands to this new Military Museum, which has been created by the Queen's Royal Lancers, the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry and the South Notts Hussars – with a little help from their Friends.

The ongoing contribution that the Friends are making will help to ensure that the three fine collections of arms, uniforms, medals, silver and paintings, illustrating the role our local Regiments have played in the great battles of the last three centuries, will be on view to the public for a long time to come.

The superb displays, which can be seen today, are the result of a major project led by Brigadier William Hurrell, the Colonels of the Regiments, the museum's Board of Trustees and the many volunteers from the three Regiments.

The free-to-enter museum, which is attracting such interest from serving soldiers, veterans, families and tourists, extends across the top floor of a wing of the Thoresby Courtyard, a listed building on the Thoresby Estate in north Nottinghamshire.

This project has been made possible through a partnership with the Stonebridge Trust, who have generously contributed to the capital costs, as has the Leader Project, which provides European money for rural regeneration, and the Heritage Lottery Fund.

"The Thoresby Courtyard not only provides a first rate venue for the museum but safeguards the long term future of these three fine collections," says Brigadier Hurrell.

With professionally designed displays and interpretation boards, the museum tells the human, social and military history of the Regiments, as well as the ongoing story of the British Army today.

Meet the Curator

Former Regimental Sergeant Major Mick Holtby is the Curator of The Queen's Royal Lancers and Nottinghamshire Yeomanry Museum.

Captain Mick Holtby served in Northern Ireland, Cyprus, Germany and the Oman during a 25-year career with the 17/21st Lancers.

After taking up a retired officer post at the headquarters of The Queen's Royal Lancers in Grantham, he was involved in setting up the newly amalgamated Lancers' museum, of which he became curator, and which used to be housed at Belvoir Castle.

Mick, who is also Assistant Regimental Secretary of The Queen's Royal Lancers, grew up in Hull and worked as an apprentice mason before joining the Army at 18. He had always wanted to be in the armoured corps and became a career soldier, progressing to the rank of RSM with the 17/21st Lancers, where he was subsequently commissioned.

Having an in-depth knowledge of British cavalry and armoured warfare, his special interests include the Crimean Campaign of 1854-56, and in particular the Charge of the Light Brigade, as well as the Second World War in North Africa, where he has travelled extensively.



Princess Praises

Friends of the Museum watched as HRH The Princess Alexandra officially opened The Queen's Royal Lancers and Nottinghamshire Yeomanry Museum, which tells the dramatic history and present day involvement of local army regiments.

On arrival in Nottinghamshire, Princess Alexandra was greeted by the Lord-Lieutenant of Nottinghamshire, Sir Andrew Buchanan Bt, KCVO.

At the museum she met members of the Board of Trustees, including the honorary Colonels of the Regiments, and representatives of the growing network of Friends of the Museum, who are supporting this landmark project.

New Military Museum

Nottinghamshire Hussars, have amalgamated their collections to create a combined museum within the Thoresby Courtyard, in partnership with The Stonebridge Trust.

The Stonebridge Trust have not only provided space in the Thoresby Courtyard for the Museum's galleries, but have also contributed funding to the capital costs of the project. Other funding has come from the Leader Project and the Heritage Lottery Fund.

After a tour of the Museum, and an opportunity to meet Friends of the Museum and other guests at a reception in the Thoresby Riding Hall, Princess Alexandra unveiled a plaque to mark the occasion.

She told guests that she was impressed by the Museum and was thrilled it had successfully brought together the history of the three Regiments in one place.

Princess Alexandra congratulated all those who had contributed to the project which is enabling so many magnificent artefacts, not easily accessed by the public in the past, to be shown off in such impressive surroundings, and wished the museum every success in the future.

Receiving almost 10,000 visitors in the three months following the opening ceremony, the museum tells the human, social and military history of the Regiments and the ongoing story of the British Army today.

A unique collection of arms, uniforms, medals, silver and paintings illustrate the role that the local Regiments have played in the great battles of the last three centuries and, indeed continue to play in international conflicts of the present day.

On the day of the Royal opening, Project Director Brigadier William Hurrell said the concept for the museum began about three years ago and he was thrilled with the final display.

"We have artefacts here such as the bugle which sounded the charge in the Crimean War. It is a

very informative and educational display which will appeal to all ages," he said.

As well as celebrating military history, the museum provides a fascinating insight into how the Yeomanry was raised in Nottinghamshire with the help of the great families of the county, such as the Pierreponts, Cavendish-Bentincks, Howards and Pelhams in the Dukeries, to help maintain law and order at a time when England was governed by the landed gentry.

The Pierreponts lived at Thoresby Hall, so it is most fitting that the new museum, which brings together three fine regimental collections not normally seen by the public, should find its home within the Thoresby Estate.

As it is free to enter, the museum enables the public, especially families, and visitors to the area to learn about local history through the eyes of the collection.

The museum is working closely with schools, so an education room has been created for visiting groups. There is also a shop selling a range of military souvenirs and a book which has been specially produced telling the history of the three Regiments..

As a former Territorial Army Officer with The South Nottinghamshire Hussars and the Sherwood Rangers, Nottinghamshire born Bill was guest of honour at a special event for supporters of the Museum.

Bill, who appears in the Antiques Roadshow, eight times a year, gave his view on exhibits from the three regimental collections which are now on display at the Museum, including pistols, muskets, cavalry swords and muskets used in famous military campaigns.

He was introduced by Colonel Tim Richmond, Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Nottinghamshire, a trustee of the museum, and his former commanding officer in the South Notts Hussars.

A nationally recognised expert in firearms, ballistics and related matters, Bill is Director of Firearms for the British Association of Shooting and Conservation.

"I had the best part of 20 very happy years with the TA in Nottinghamshire," said Bill, who believes the idea of opening a museum which is the guardian of the region's military heritage, is absolutely fantastic.
